

A LOCAL bishop has reacted to the news of Pope Benedict XVI's resignation, support-ing the leader of the world's Catholics in his decision.

The German-born Pope Be-nedict announced his resignation, spoken in Latin, at a meeting with world cardinals in his residence in the Apos-tolic Palace on Monday.

The Pope said he would re-sign due to old age (he is 85) on February 28 after just eight years as Pope, making his one of the shortest pontif-icates in modern history.

"I have come to the certainty that my strengths, due to an advanced age, are no long-er suited to an adequate exercise of the Petrine ministry. Pope Benedict said.

The only other resigna-tions of popes are known to be Celestine V, who resigned in 1294, and Gregory XII, who abdicated his role in 1415.

Jarrett of Lismore Diocese spoke of the shock move yesterday.

"Pope Benedict's announcement of his retirement at the end of this month has taken us by surprise. After all, of the 265 popes in history, only two have resigned, the last in 1415," Rev Jarrett said. "Yet, on reflection the deci-

sion will be recognised as quite in character with this humble and courageous leader who has always been a clear thinker and a man of decisive action.

"The church is always mov-ing on and by Easter we expect a new pope to be elected to lead the Catholic Church."

Rev Jarrett asked people of faith for their prayers in the process of choosing a new which commences on February 28, and to remem-ber Pope Benedict "with gra-titude for his Christian teach-

ing and leadership".

"Pope Benedict has the sharp mind of surely one of the keenest thinkers and scholars of his era

"We will remember him for his clear, profound but simple teaching of eternal truths, especially about the dignity of the human person and his strong warning against the dictatorship of relativism which takes over when people forget God."

stance would prompt similar action from councils across Australia, placing pressure on the Federal Government to reverse its op-position to gay marriage in this election year.

He said even those not convinced by the equality argument may be persuad-ed by the amount of pink dollars such a stance would likely inject into the shire's economy.

Cr Richardson said he would liaise with locals and groups like Australian Mar-riage Equality and the Greens' own equivalent group before bringing a mo-

tion before council at Easter. Shane Duniam from Northern Rivers gay and lesbian group Tropical Fruits said such symbolic support would likely en-hance the Northern Rivers' growing reputation as a gay

travel Mecca.

Mr Duniam said it was important that councils were inclusive. "Just the

recognition would mean a lot. Symbols are important," he said.

But deputy mayor Diane Woods said social issues were not the domain of local government.

"I'm not against the concept but it's got nothing to do with us," Cr Woods said.
